I have a friend. My friend is a single father of two and works two jobs to make ends meet. Last week, he asked me to keep an eye out for a new place for his family to live." Anything will do," he told me, "All my girls and I need is a roof over our heads." "I just don't want to go back to the shelter."

Here at Family Promise Salt Lake, we know that home is so much more than a roof over our heads. Home is the place where family meals are prepared and shared, homework is completed, and birthday parties are held. Our homes serve as anchors for physical and emotional health and wellness. Above the offices of FPSL, we are proud to say that we have three dedicated apartments that are part of our Transitional Housing Program. In addition, we have a duplex that we also use as part of the program. Working with FPSL case management, families pay a fee each month and incrementally increase that fee until they reach financial stability. It is their "home away from home" until they are able move into a new place. But, to create a place to call 'home', a roof is still needed.

Recently, the FPSL Board of Directors and I began the process of replacing the roof at the Family Promise Day Center located at 814 W 800 S in Salt Lake City. The years of wear and tear have caused leaks in the building. And, with winter now here, the need is more urgent than ever. Working with area non-profits and roofing professionals, we are well on our way to putting a roof over the heads of the families who sleep there at night and the families who use the Day Center during working hours. In fact, it appears that all the labor and material will be donated thanks to our friends at Homeaidutah.org. Together, our community is helping to fulfill the dreams of the families we serve come true.


More than Just Shelter; The importance of Case Management

Case management is a broad and encompassing term that can change meanings depending on the organization in which case managers work. For Family Promise Salt Lake, our focus is to help families gain long-lasting independence and stability. In this context, case management requires offering needed services and resources to families, as well as support, understanding and a sense of community.

In the first two weeks with Family Promise Salt Lake, I have been taking steps to build a relationship with each of our families to ensure they will be able to succeed in our programs. I started by meeting with each of the families and introducing myself. I wanted this process to be as welcoming as possible, as I understand it can be difficult for a stranger to enter someone's living space and begin to "tell them what to do." Rather, I spoke with the guests to let them know that case managers and guests work as a team, and I am on their side as an advocate. After meeting with each of the families and listening to their needs, I created individualized case management plans for each head of household. These case management plans include goals such as maintaining a clean-living space, employment, and affordable housing searches. Each of the goals have completion dates, which helps motivate guests to move forward in the program and understand the importance of managing their time and expectations.

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
