As a clergyperson in the United United Methodist Church, I have had the privilege and honor to officiate numerous weddings. If I am honest, my wedding homily/sermon is always the same. Sure, the names and places change, and I try to work in a few personal stories about the couple, but the message is always about... love.

I tell gathered friends and family how beautiful the bride is and how the groom is as handsome as I have ever seen him. I talk about the exquisite decorations and the celebration that will follow the service. But then, I set the hook. Across the country, the backbone of Family Promise affiliates is the unique shelter model known as "the rotation." Since 1995 churches across the Salt Lake Valley have served as hosting sites who are in the "rotation." Currently we have 12 hosting congregations. Each hosting congregation takes a turn welcoming Family Promise guests for 1-2 weeks at a time. Besides offering their buildings as shelter, these faith-based but non-proselytizing communities supply trained volunteers who journey alongside our guests in the program. "Supporting congregations" add additional volunteers and help to the hosting congregations. This unique model creates a holistic and community-based response to family homelessness. Sadly, the Covid-19 pandemic placed this model on pause for most Family Promise affiliates across the country including FPSL.

FPSL Board of Directors and Staff are considering re-starting the "rotation" once the pandemic becomes more manageable. Working with FPSL Volunteer Program Coordinators Bill Woods and Becky Buxton, FPSL Executive Director Brian Diggs is in the process of meeting with each hosting congregation to explore how to best move forward serving future guests in the program and to vision what FPSL will look like long after the pandemic.

FINALLY HOME!

Key to the mission of FPSL is placing families into sustainable housing. Recent increases in the number of homeless families across the nation has continued to concern government entities and social service agencies. According to the National Alliance to End Homelessness, children experiencing homelessness are at a greater risk of emotional and behavioral problems, experiencing serious health problems, and are more likely to drop out of school. FPSL is excited to help place another family into housing as a response to this growing crisis.
